The strength of democracy

Democracies tend to produce outcomes that people value:

- avoid calamities (such as famines and wars)
- enhance human well-being along several dimensions: health, life expectancy, equality, happiness, etc.
- provide better protections for the environment
- better at dealing with crises (such as a pandemic)

Democratic reason

The epistemic argument for democracy: A system uniquely able to make knowledge based decisions and solve societal problems.

Basic mechanisms:

- Collective intelligence pooling of knowledge across society through voting
- Public deliberations debates driven by arguments aimed at the common good


Open Society Barometer 2023

- Age 18-35: Only 53% thought democracy was preferable to any other system (compared to 71% for those over 56)
- 42% of younger people supportive of military rule (29% in the US and France...)

The "truth crisis"

- High-choice information environment: individual abilities and motivations become more important
- This has effected people's trust and use of established news media
- Increased amount of false and misleading information, primarily as an effect of the lack of gatekeepers.

Epistemic cynisism

Corrosive falsehoods: Attacks on professional journalism and science


- Undermine trust in sources of higher quality
- Causes hostility to processes with higher epistemic demands
- Promotes belief that it is fruitless to seek truth



The knowledge shield

- Knowledge about the nature and value of democracy
- Knowledge about the dangers of the new information environment
- Knowledge about what characterizes reliable sources
- Strong basic knowledge about society and its history....
